



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
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BROCKDISH CARPET BOWLS

Brockdish Common has belonged to us, the parishioners, for the past 200 years but we didn't know! How did that happen? In 1974 the national Commons Registration Authority decided there was no known owner of Brockdish Common and took the Common under its own protection. This had the effect of allowing successive Councils to administer the common but without any powers to intervene to use it for the benefit of parishioners. Turns out they were wrong. This was because the Parish Council in the post Second World War years of the 20th century had simply ignored Brockdish Common's documented history and did not intervene in 1974 to claim ownership.

Following up on Derek Clark's update on the development of the Common in the last Mardler (p 12, Oct/November 2019) it seemed like a good time to think about its history. Actually, it was Derek's throw-away line, "it would be nice to know ..." that got me started. Most of the information here is from parish documents and maps in the Norfolk Record Office and the National Archive.

Brockdish Common is a registered common (number CL125), made up of two parcels of land. The southern-most part, off Common Lane is a County Wildlife Site (CWS 68). The northern common is a strip of sloping ground that runs north up the east side of Grove Road behind the school up to its northerly border at Hall Road. In the old tithe map of 1838, it is referred to as 'Foredale' but this may be a misprint for Foreland. The whole common is small, just under 4 acres.

Earliest days. Why is the Common called the Common?

Before easy land drainage was possible, there were always areas of farmland that were less productive and difficult to improve. This 'wasteland' provided some essentials of life though, for example foraged fruit and berries and hunted food like rabbits and birds, and wood as fuel. Although it is often thought that land was common to all, or that some has no owner, that is incorrect. Originally it would have been tenants or peasants living on the local manor who had

common rights, but in later periods it was identified individuals with named rights, such as grazing sheep or cattle, which could be passed from one generation to the next.

The Manorial Landholders of Brockdish Common 1585-1974.

Before 1585 there were two main manors in Brockdish, Brockdish Earl manor based around Brockdish Place (now Thorpe Abbotts Place) estate and Brockdish Hall manor based around Brockdish Hall of course. In 1585 however William Grice of Brockdish Place bought the Hall manor from William Howard and the two manors were united under one owner. So the joint manor proprietor or Lord owned the commons and the families who owned the joint manor retained ownership until the early 19th century, when the manor and Hall were sold to John Birkbeck, a wealthy man who lived in Settle in Yorkshire and acted as absentee landowner to a succession of farming tenants on the hall and manor lands. Birkbeck was a wealthy banker in Yorkshire, quite an interesting character, whose sons became early mountaineers. Over the years however the common land had dwindled down to just a few acres because of the Enclosures.


The Enclosures Begin in Tudor times.

Brockdish Common land would originally have been many more acres than today, distributed in various strips around the parish. As farming practices improved, some holders of arable strips would agree to stop enforcing their common rights against each other, and physically ENCLOSE (often the word INCLOSE was used) individual or multiple strips of land with hedges or fences. This allowed them to improve their own holdings as they wished. The process of enclosure gathered momentum in Tudor times, in response to the growth of the wool market, and gained a bad reputation for depriving landless labourers of a living, by turning what was mixed farmland to pasture for sheep, with much lower requirements for labour. In south Norfolk vast tracts of land that had been held in common were divided up between landowners, who swapped strips around between them so their pieces were adjacent and leaving only fairly small patches of common land to be used in the old way.

Since Brockdish remained a good arable area with some marsh grazing land for cattle, the parish did not get overrun by sheep. Nevertheless, enclosures proceeded apace. Sadly, there are no records of these early enclosures in Brockdish although it is clear that the majority of enclosures occurred early here.

The 19th century. Brockdish landowners decide to enclose the majority of good arable Brockdish land.

By the 18th century, legal agreements between landlords were superseded by Acts of Parliament, particularly where the lord of the manor wished to drive improvement in the productivity of the manor's agriculture, or there was pressure from the tenants. The increased investment improved yields and allowed an expansion in population, which in turn prompted more innovation to produce enough food. The Europe-wide Napoleonic Wars of the early 19thcentury also highlighted the vulnerability of the country's food supplies, and a great deal of Parliamentary enclosure took place in the following years.

Brockdish parish had almost all been enclosed before the Enclosure Enabling Act of 1801 and does not show therefore on the early map of Norfolk drawn up by Faden, 1797.

Early 19th century enclosures. Brockdish Commons Deed of Covenant 1821 and Enclosure Awards 1825.

In 1821, John Birkbeck, Lord of the Manor, with the help of an official commissioner Richard Brettingham, drew up a Deed of Covenant for the existing Brockdish Common, a tidying up exercise designed to write down exactly who had rights to do what and where. This was done with the support and agreement of the various parish landowners who had rights on the various bits of common.

The problem was that the deed of covenant didn't stop squabbling between the various landowners over who could use the land; "disputes had arisen between parties". Four years later in 1825 Birkbeck seems to have decided to sell most of the common land to the various common rights holders. Brettingham the Commissioner came back to do a formal enclosure award. All the local landowners who had common rights then acquired the freehold of their bits of land, all that is except the remaining common that we still have today, probably because no one wanted it.

John Birkbeck, who was a philanthropist as well as huge landowner, seems to have decided to donate the remaining small Brockdish Common to the parish so that in future, the common rights would be supervised by an appointed group of trustees who would be called the Brockdish Common Rights Trustees. Presumably Birkbeck was tired of the squabbling and thought it best to hand over the small amount of land and delegate the responsibility to a group of parishioners, appointed by the Churchwardens and Trustees of the parish.

The Chairman of the Trustees for Brockdish Common Rights was the Brockdish Churchwarden, and just as it happens, the Churchwarden Thomas Clarke Brettingham was the owner of Brockdish Place estate, the son of the enclosure commissioner. The arrangement must have

been negotiated between father and son with Birkbeck's approval. So, on the tithe map drawn up in 1839 the plots owned by the Trustees are named to Thomas Clarke Brettingham as 'Landowner Party' for the Brockdish Common Rights Trustees. IT WAS OURS!

The Commons Registration Act of 1965

Any common land not registered within the time limit of the 1965 act ceased to be common or carry any common rights. So, in 1968 Brockdish Common and Foreland was registered under the Commons Registration Act of 1965 but without any known owner. Clearly the Brockdish Commons Rights Trustees were no longer active; they had become history and had been totally forgotten.

Norfolk County Council decided in 1974 that there was no owner of Brockdish Common and the map submitted in 1968 was wrong.

The County Council held a Commission of Enquiry in 1974 and 'No person came forward to claim ownership upon public notice'. "There was no appearance at the hearing". Why was that? Where was Brockdish Parish Council? The County Council also declared that an area of land on the south-west side of Common Lane going down to the river had been wrongly omitted from the register in 1968.

Getting the Map Right 2015.

In spite of the map being clearly wrong, there was no provision to correct mistakes in the registers until part 1 of the Commons Act 2006 came into effect in England in 2015. We know now that actually if the Brockdish Commons Rights Trustees had still been active the parish council would have been able to demonstrate they were owners. The judgment also confirmed that the only rights of commonage on Brockdish Common were for cattle and sheep, no other farming activities or rights were registered. Through Derek Clark's patient persistence, the map was corrected in 2017.

The position today, 2019.

The Common and Foreland in Brockdish have played a tiny agricultural role since the last enclosure of 1825. The Common has been used for grazing no more than a couple of head of cattle, most recently by former owners of Crowe Hall during the Second World war. It now clearly comes within the responsibility of Brockdish and Thorpe Abbotts Parish Council. There are a wealth of native species of wild flower, evidence of ancient woodland and a haven for butterflies, hoverflies and birds. A mown path is taking shape and donations of seating for a picnic and a comfortable, smart bench made by Oscar Housego, dedicated to his father's memory, have made it a place to pause and enjoy the wildlife. There are now plans to improve the ambience further to constrain brambles and nettles and to let the Common flourish again as a place of recreation.



Keep your garden tools and mowers in good condition, servicing and storing them properly at this time of year is worthwhile as it will help to make sure they work well and last for years to come.

Another important job is to sweep patios and driveways so that any slippery algae and leaves are cleared away. Keep clearing up any leaves so that slugs and snails can't shelter beneath them.

Now is a good time for repairing fences, trellises, pergolas, replacing any loose posts or any that might be rotting at the base before they collapse.

The remains of any old crops should be cleared away, and added to your compost heap or to your garden composter tidying the area and preparing the ground for next year.

A layer of compost can be spread over the soil once cleared. Work the compost into the surface. Also treat timber with preservative or wood colouring when perennial and annual climbers have either died away or lost their leaves.

With period costume set in high-born France, this is a fantastic spectacle.



CHRISTMAS TARTE AMANDINE



This tart is very special, and will feed many guests over Christmas. It freezes well too. Use a 500g (1lb 2oz) pack of shortcrust pastry if time is short.

Ingredients

For the pastry

225g (8oz) plain flour, 100g (4oz) butter cubed, 50g (2oz) caster sugar, 1 egg, 1tbsp water.

For the almond filling

175g (6oz) butter, 175g (6oz) caster sugar, 4 eggs, 175g (6oz) ground almonds, 1tsp almond extract, a generous ½ jar of mincemeat.

For the topping

About 75g (3oz) icing sugar, juice of 1 lemon, about 50g (2oz) flaked almonds.

Recipe

- 1 Preheat the oven to 190°C/fan 170°C/gas 5, and put a heavy, flat baking tray in it to heat.
- 2 Make the pastry, either by rubbing the flour and butter together by hand or by whizzing them in a processor. Add the sugar and mix for a moment, then add the egg and water. Mix until it just holds together.
- Roll the pastry out on a floured surface and use to line a 28cm (11in) flan tin. There should be ample to fit the tin. Prick the base of the pastry using a fork.
- 4 Next, make the filling. Mix the butter and sugar until creamy, add the eggs and blend, then mix in the ground almonds and extract.
- 5 Spread a thin layer of mincemeat over the base of the pastry and spoon the almond mixture on top.
- 6 Sit the tart tin on the hot baking sheet, and bake in the preheated oven for 45-50 minutes until the pastry is crisp and golden brown.
- 7 To finish, make a glacé icing from the icing sugar and lemon juice, adding water to make it a pouring consistency. Spread over the tart and sprinkle with flaked almonds. Return to the oven for about 5 minutes.

PREPARING AHEAD

The pastry lined flan tin can be kept, covered with clingfilm, in the fridge for up to 12 hours. Filled with the mincemeat and almond mixture, it can be kept for about 1 hour, covered and refrigerated. You can also freeze the tart after the end of step 7. Cool, wrap and freeze for up to 1 month. Defrost overnight.
