There is No Such Word as Can't by Tim Stockdale (reviewed by Tricia Fincham)

Tim Stockdale was a very successful British equestrian. He rode his own horses as well as riding horses owned by others. He competed up to Olympic level and was still competing up until his diagnosis of stomach cancer in 2018. As well as competing, Tim also shared his wealth of knowledge by offering training courses and appearing in various TV programmes.

This book starts at the beginning of his life, with the introduction of his first pony which he kept in the garden shed. He was not born with a silver spoon in his mouth and worked hard to achieve his success. A typical northerner, he writes with wit and humour as he tells of various antics he got up to. 
Miss Benson's Beetle by Rachel Joyce

'There is No Such Word As Can't' could equally apply to the book I am reviewing for you this issue.

Miss Benson's Beetle is written by Rachel Joyce, the author of 'The Unlikely Pilgrimage of Harold Fry', 'Perfect', 'The Love Song of Miss Queeenie Hennessy' and 'The Music Shop'.

Miss Benson's Beetle is a enjoyable book. It is set in the 1950's in a drab post-war London. Margery Benson, frustrated by her job as a home economics teacher, decides to go on an adventure in search of the Golden Beetle of New Caledonia, which may or may not even exist! Her unlikely companion is Edith Pretty.



Their quest takes them across the world to Australia and on to New Caledonia, which is a French Colony. Setting out with very little money and surviving on their wits, a lasting friendship develops from the scrapes they get into on their way.

Behind the tale of their madcap adventures, there is a profound message of the importance of friendship, the fight for recognition that women in those times faced, and also of the way in which we are sometimes too hasty to judge others. It is humorous, tragic and memorable.

<u>Memories from Doris Chenery Thorpe Abbotts - As it Was</u> <u>Published on the 25th Anniversary 150th Edition of the Mardler Magazine,</u> <u>April 2007</u>

The People of Thorpe Abbotts, February 1918

I will now try and tell you what I remember about some of the people who lived in Thorpe Abbotts when I first came to live here in February 1918 a few months before the Armistice. I was nine years old. My father came to work on the farmed owned by the Misses Kay and we lived in the house now owned by Mr and Mrs Balding; next door lived Mrs Lanham and her family, her husband at that time being away in the forces.

The Misses Eva and Marion Kay lived at Thorpe Abbotts place and owned most of the village, except those farms I have mentioned before as being independent. Mr Walter Brundle was their tenant farmer and lived at Highfields. He was very large man and a very kind one as well.

My maternal grandfather, Mr Robert Mills, was a farm steward to Miss Kay. He was then over 70 and lived at the Grange with his daughter Nell. He rode around the farm in a high gig with his old sheepdog Bob running free. He could neither read or write, but could count with the best.

Thorpe Abbotts place looked very different in those days; a mansion built to house a team of servants, as well as a large family. There were white doves flying everywhere and a cuckoo clock in every room. Miss Kay's butler, Mr Adams, was a lovely, old, roly-poly, short man who lived in Home Farm with his German wife. He was a kind man, full of fun. He always saw to it that Miss Kay knew if there was anyone in the village ill or in trouble. His daughter Nellie was Mss Kay' lady's maid.

Inside the house was Mrs Valiant, cook-housekeeper, who was a truly majestic figure; kitchen maid, between maid, two housemaids, one footman and one pageboy. Outside was Mr Charles Chilver, head gardener, and three or four beneath him.

Local History

As it was war time, the car was locked in the garage. When the ladies went out, they were driven in the carriage by Mr Ishmael Redgrave, coachman, and attended by the footman and page.

Once or twice a week, Miss Kay would trot down to the village on her high heels accompanied by her collie dog Flossie, who was nearly as tall as she was. She always looks as if she was floating along, for she seemed to have ribbons and scarves fluttering all around her. If she noticed on her walk anyone's gate with a latch broken, a little note would come down to William Chenery, Harry's father, next morning, asking him to see to it.

I was amazed one day when I first came here. A group of us children were walking home from school to dinner one day, when we met Miss Kay on the corner by the Red Lion. At once, all the girls went down almost on their knees and all the boys' right hands went up to their caps. "You didn't curtsey to Miss Kay!" I was accused. It was the first time I had ever heard of such a thing!



A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

Congratulations to everyone who were recently recognised as Community Champions in South Norfolk for their work over the past year. The 14 awards were handed out to individuals who had gone "above and beyond to improve the lives of local residents over the past year". I would like to mention Lizzy Pegg who picked up the award on behalf of her group, the Harleston Kindness Hub, which has spent the last year and a half picking up shopping and prescriptions for elderly and vulnerable residents in the town. Another winner of this award was Matthew Scade, the project manager for the Waveney Foodbank, which gave out more than 1,000 meals a day to people in need over the past year. Also recognised was Park Radio whose team of volunteers continued to provide listeners with regular information throughout the pandemic.

Proposals for the Long Stratton bypass took a significant step closer when Government confirmed funding for the project. Approval of Norfolk County Council's outline business case submitted in January, was granted by the Department for Transport, along with a funding commitment of £26.2 million towards the cost of building the new road, which promises to cut congestion and support the local economy for years to come. Subject to receiving all of the necessary statutory approvals, including planning permission, the target date for construction work to start is mid-2023, with the road open to traffic before the end of 2024.

Rural homes and businesses across Norfolk and Suffolk will get next-generation gigabit broadband brought to them under a plan to level up internet access across the UK. The Project Gigabit programme targets properties that would otherwise have been left behind as broadband companies roll out plans, prioritising those that currently have the slowest connections. Their available speeds will rocket to more than 1,000 megabits or one gigabit per second – enough to download a High Definition movie in less 30 seconds and to lay the foundations for tomorrow's technology, such as 8K-quality streaming.

A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

Businesses in Norfolk and Suffolk are being encouraged to take advantage of a new capital grant opportunity of up to £30,000. DRIVE, the Delivering Rural Investment for Vital Employment Programme, wants to hear from small and medium-sized enterprises (SMEs) to grow the region's rural economy. Launched in February 2021, the new £3m scheme is funded by the European Regional Development Fund. The programme supports local businesses to invest in new projects that benefit their growth and new employment. Applications can be made for up to 40% of total project costs, with a minimum grant of £5,000 and a maximum of £30,000. NCC has been recognised for its outstanding support of the armed forces community in Norfolk, following an announcement from the Ministry of Defence. The local authority has been given the Gold Award, the highest honour handed out through the Defence Employer Recognition Scheme. The award is given to organisations that employ and support those who serve in the armed forces, service leavers, veterans and their families. The Gold Award also acknowledges the Council's partnership working through the Norfolk Armed Forces Covenant Board.

Shrubs

Shrubs are woody, long-lived plants that form the backbone of most gardens. There is such a variety to choose from: flowering, some with attractive stems and others with interesting foliage. Some are back-of-the-border stalwarts, while others are ground coverers or can be grown in containers.



Container-grown shrubs can be planted all year round, as long as the ground is not frozen or water-logged. If planting in summer, it is important to keep the shrubs well watered. Spring and Autumn are really the best time for planting.

If the planting area is new or has not been cultivated for a long while, dig in some farmyard manure compost. This is also a good idea if the soil is very sandy or like heavy clay. Dig a hole twice the width and depth of the root ball, and half back-fill with tree and shrub compost, or Ericaceous compost if the shrub is acid-loving, mixed half and half with dug out soil. Make sure that the root ball will be buried no deeper than 2-3 cm from the surface. Fill around the root with the soil/compost mix, firming as you go. Aim to leave a slight indentation in the soil around the shrub so that water will pool around it, helping to keep the soil moist. Keep an eye on the planting for the first three months to make sure the new shrubs do not dry out.

Colour in the winter months can be achieved by planting Spirea and Cotinus, which produce colourful leaves. Cornus Alba Sibirica is well known for its bright scarlet stems that shine in the winter sun. There are other varieties, and for the best effect plant in blocks of the same colour. An effect of twisted stems can be achieved by planting a variety of hazelnut with curly leaves that fall in the autumn to reveal a contorted framework. Earlier in winter, Witch Hazel, Winter Honeysuckle and Vibernum flower on bare wood and are very nicely scented.

Meaty Morsels

MEATBALL STROGANOFF (serves 4)

200g beef mince

Drizzle of oil

1 red onion, sliced

2 garlic cloves, crushed

200g pack small button mushrooms, sliced

2 tbsps tomato puree

1 tbsp sweet paprika

1 tbsp plain flour

1 beef stock cube, made up to 300ml stock

150ml pot sour cream

Chopped parsley

- Season the beef and shape into walnut size pieces. Brown in oil.
 Remove from the pan and set aside.
- 2. Soften the onion in the pan and then add the garlic and mushrooms. Cook until mushrooms soften and brown a little.

STICKY SAUSAGES WITH SWEETCORN SALAD (serves 4)

Oven 200°C/180°C fan, gas mark 6

2 red onions cut into wedges

8 good quality pork sausages

1 tbsp olive oil

2 tbsps mayonnaise

2 tbsps natural yoghurt

3 spring onions, finely sliced

198g can sweetcorn, drained

3 tbsps tomato chutney

750g bag baby new potatoes



- 1. Toss the red onions and sausages with the oil in a shallow baking dish. Roast for 25 minutes, turning for even browning.
- Boil the potatoes for 12-15 minutes until tender, run under cold water and drain.
- 3. Mix the mayonnaise, yoghurt, spring onions and sweetcorn in a large bowl. Thickly slice the potatoes and stir through.
- 4. Turn oven up to 220°C/200°C fan, gas mark 7. Add the chutney to the sausages and onions. Cook for 5 minutes more until sausages and onions are cooked and sticky. Serve with the potato salad.

Thorpe Abbotts All Saints Church

The Scythe and Churchyard.

As you will all know, for the past 15 years we have been managing the Churchyard at All Saints for wildlife. Recently, we have increased the area under management so that approximately 80% is now left for wildlife. In reality, what this means is that the areas under management are left to grow, with the sward taken down and removed mid to late September once all the wildflowers have set seed.



This year in June we undertook a survey of the area, and found well over 150 different plant species. This would have just been a snap shot since many of the species, such as Meadow Saxifrage, Yellow Aconite and of course the three species of Snowdrop, had already been and gone, but what was included was the stunning display of Pyramidal and Bee Orchids, of which there were over 100 plants! Quite why they were so good this year I am not sure, but it may have something to do with our damp spring.

Whilst most of the sward is removed by a local contractor, I have always done one area with my trusty scythe. Up till the 1830's when the first lawn mowers came into existence, scything was the only way to get in cereal crops and make hay.



Even the lawns of the great estate houses were done this way or grazed by sheep. The most common scythe in use today is the Austrian version which is lighter and a slightly different shape to the traditional English, and it is the one I have used. Amazingly, it is faster cutting than a strimmer; not only does it leave the cut grass in a winrow down one side of the cut making it easier to collect, but also it is simply faster.

I will have to say the scythes man in the video was the UK champion, but nevertheless you can see which wins by some way. Now I cannot say that my technique is as good as his, but, as they say, practice makes perfect! Whilst the main area to be cut by scythe has now been done, I will be up there again to do those areas where we cannot get a mower.

A big thank you for all those who have had the lights on celebrating or remembering over the recent months. It is so lovely to see the Church alight. It costs just £5 a night, and the money goes straight into our Maintenance Fund from which we draw frequently in the upkeep of this Grade 1 listed, 900 year old Church.
