The Red Hill by David Penny

The Red Hill is the first in a series of books taking place between 1482 and 1501. With the exception of the latest instalment, all of the tales are set in Moorish Spain, which gives them an interesting twist. David Penny's hero is a physician and soldier, an Englishman called Thomas Berrington, living in what is now known as Granada. Berrington possesses a keen sense of justice, is extremely sharp, and enjoys an uneasy relationship with the presiding sultan. It comes as no surprise that Thomas is the individual chosen to investigate a series of mysterious murders in and around Alhambra. His inquiries are conducted with the able assistance of close friend Jorge, a eunuch at the palace. Jorge is a charming character, in sharp contrast to Thomas's curmudgeonly edge, and his manner often comes in handy given the pair's tendency to end up in sticky situations.




Penny's writing is often mentioned in the same breath as that of C. J. Sansom: the Berrington books are set in a similar time period, and the early Tudor era is fascinating. The series is made all the more colourful in Penny's choice of setting: prior to reading these books, I knew next-to-nothing about Moorish Spain, and how things developed with the rise of the Castiles to the north. Thomas, together with his likeable friends and family, is always right in the thick of the action, and I'm always sad when I reach the end of one of David Penny's books — the sign of a story well-told! Thoroughly recommended.

The Book Club recommends...


The Locked Room by Elly Griffiths (Book 14 of the Dr Ruth Galloway crime series)

Having been a fan of this author for many years I was delighted to attend the recent book launch in Southwold of "The Locked Room" - the latest in the "Dr Ruth Galloway" crime series. The books can be read as standalones, but, in my opinion, are best read in order. Dr Ruth Galloway, Forensic Archaeologist and Head of Archaeology at the fictitious University of North Norfolk, and DCI Harry Nelson of Norfolk Constabulary, are central to every book, whilst other characters make regular appearances. There is always a strong relationship between Ruth's work and that of the local constabulary as they solve both old and new crimes. The series features actual places in Norfolk, (sometimes renamed), and historical events which are skilfully entwined with fiction to give a fascinating insight into some of the rich history of Norfolk.

"The Locked Room", which was written during the first lockdown, features excavations for a new roundabout in Tombland, and the discovery of a skeleton which could date back to the fourteenth century (possibly buried in a plague pit). The story then moves on to contemporary suicides which don't quite add up, a kidnap, and COVID. Readers will recognise lecturers teaching their students via zoom, and home schooling whilst trying to work from home, but perhaps not Griffiths' insight into socially distanced police murder investigations.



Crime fiction is not everyone's cup of tea, but Elly Griffiths writes sensitively, and although covering the macabre subject of murder and historic archaeological excavations, the reader is spared the blood and gore loved by so many crime writers, so, hopefully, will not cause you sleepless nights! If you like a good unputdownable yarn then this book (and this series) is for you (book 15 is due out in early 2023!).

A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

The Norfolk Strategic Flooding Alliance (NSFA) have identified twenty Norfolk areas at regular risk of flooding. These places, which include 'The catchment of the Becks in Pulham St Mary and Common Lane and Grove Road in Brockdish' are places where work is most needed to mitigate flooding risk. Once investigations at these sites are complete, the NSFA's members will begin sourcing funding to carry out the work needed to prevent flooding in these areas. This comes after the NSFA previously announced 16 initial areas susceptible to flooding which have since seen work begin to improve their situation, Redenhall being one of those.

The Government has published the White Paper on the theme of 'Levelling Up'. Norfolk is one of 9 areas in the country that have been invited to participate in further negotiations with central government for a 'Deal for Norfolk'. As a result, there is now a potentially significant opportunity to take this forward to benefit the whole of Norfolk. The focus for Norfolk has always been, and will continue to be, on ensuring that we are best positioned as a county to take advantage of these opportunities, allowing us to have more local control and power to bring investment into our communities and thereby improve the services our residents use. We are committed to working with all our partners across local government, the public, private, voluntary and community sectors in informing the shape and delivery of any potential deal.

The 1 Million Trees for Norfolk project have received a boost this spring, as the planting of five mini forests in February has taken place. Innovative, tennis court size, Miyawaki forests are being trialled for the first time in Norfolk. These will follow a tree planting approach developed by Japanese botanist Dr Akira Miyawaki.

A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

Five councils are joining forces to make the planting of the forests possible, with the project led by Norfolk County Council. Trees were planted during February, and it is hoped it will be possible to involve schools, conservation groups and the local community at each of the planting sites. The project is part of the Trees Outside Woodlands project, funded by HM Treasury, and is running in partnership with Defra, Natural England and The Tree Council.

Platinum Jubilee Plans

There are many events being planned to celebrate The Queen's Platinum Jubilee throughout the year, including a series of Jubilee Trails which will improve access to the countryside, encouraging well-being, physical activity and environmental awareness. People of all ages will be able to take part in Norfolk's Jubilee Challenge awards by completing a series of physical, environmental, learning and creative challenges. 

Planting Hanging Baskets

Plastic hanging baskets are cheaper, and usually come lined. Pipe pots are useful and are simply attached to drainpipes. Wire or wrought iron baskets need to be lined with moss or a fine liner. The advantage of these is that planting can be done through the sides of the basket, giving a more impressive display.



Tub and basket compost is the best to use, as it contains a slow-release plant food for the first few months, and water-retaining gel that swells up when the basket is watered.

For an attractive mixed basket you will need at least three different types of plants; at least one large, upright plant, trailing plants and upright bedding plants. Put in your trailing plants spaced around the rim of the basket, tilted outwards. Place your large, upright plant in the middle of the basket, then fill in the gaps with the bedding plants. Plants will grow well provided there is a little compost around them and they are given sufficient food and water. Add more compost if needed, to ensure roots are fully covered. Water well.

If the basket is created before the end of May, keep indoors to protect from frost. Feed with tomato feed when flowering starts. Remember to dead-head to ensure better blooming through the Autumn.

Easy Peasy Tasty - Three Ingredients

Pear and Chocolate Strudel.

4 – 5 large pears150g dark chocolate1 x 375g block ready rolled puff pastry



Heat oven to 190°C/375°F/170°C fan/Gas 5.

- 1. Line a baking tray with baking parchment. Peel, core and chop pears into small chunks then chop chocolate into small pieces. Mix together.
- 2. With the narrow end of the pastry facing you, spoon the mixture into a vertical line, leaving a third of the pastry each side.
- 3. Make horizontal cuts into the exposed pastry, then fold over the top of the mixture. Tuck the ends underneath and bake for 35 to 40 mins until golden brown.
- 4. Cool and dust with icing sugar. This will keep 2-3 days in an airtight tin.

Apricot Turnovers

225g puff pastry4 tablespoons apricot conserve2 tablespoons icing sugar

Heat oven to 190°C/375°F/170°C fan/Gas 5.



- 1. Roll out the pastry to a 10 inch square, and cut into four 5 inch squares.
- 2. Place a tablespoon of conserve in the middle of each square and fold over to form a triangle, brushing the edges with water to seal.
- 3. Press the edges together gently. Bake 15 to 20 mins, cool and dust generously with icing sugar.

Why is Easter never on the same Sunday?

It is all to do with the next full moon after the Spring Equinox on March 20th, known in the Christian Calendar as the Paschal Full Moon, which may occur all the way through to April 18th. Easter happens on the following Sunday, so it can fall on any date between March 22nd and April 25th (within a week of the 18th). Easter this year is just one day after April's full Moon (Saturday, 16th April). Easter is probably the most important Christian Festival of the year, with Easter Sunday preceded by Holy Week, sometimes referred to as Passiontide. It commences on Palm Sunday, running through the week, including, of course, Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

You will without doubt have heard of Maundy Money, but just what is it? Traditionally, it revolves around the monarch giving alms to the poor. In 1931, Princess Marie Louise was at Royal Maundy (a service held on the Thursday of Holy Week), and afterwards suggested that her cousin, King George V, make the distributions the following year. He did so, beginning a new royal custom. Traditionally, the service was held in or near London. Most years in the early 20th century, it was held at Westminster Abbey. This tradition continues today. Recipients were once chosen for their poverty, and were entitled to remain as Maundy recipients for life; today, new recipients are chosen every year for service to their churches or communities.
