It was great to see the Common featuring so well in our Jubilee celebrations. The childrens' races and the dog show, not to mention the tree planting, created a lovely atmosphere and there were many positive comments about the work done by the volunteers who have done the good work in improving the Common.

That brings me to an important point. The lottery funded work of the Trust for Conservation Volunteers and their leadership of the working parties comes to an end in September. #### Waveney Heritage at The Old School, Brockdish

Well, here we are, half way through the summer. I'm writing this in July and so far the weather has been great, except we could do with a bit more rain, preferably at night! Our activities are dividing nicely into three sections: talks, archive and radios. That doesn't sound very interesting but come and see what we are up to and you'll be surprised!

We've had ten talks this year, on a great range of subjects, ranging from embroidery, thatching, witch marks, Flixton aviation museum, the River Waveney, life as a toastmaster, the 19th century workhouse and lots more. We try to invite local speakers, covering as much of the valley as we can. It goes to show what hidden talent we have in this so-called backwater! We are in the process of booking speakers for our autumn programme, so look out for details in a few weeks. We're now using Wednesday afternoons or evenings for our talks, one a month. During the summer we have been making it an evening, but when the weather gets too dark and cold we'll move over to the afternoon.

Our radio technology archive upstairs is creating a great deal of interest amongst a different group of enthusiasts. The exhibition is beautifully laid out and covers the whole story of radio from it's very beginnings. We have been donated a lot of 78 records which we have great fun playing on our record players, whilst enjoying the nostalgia generated by the sounds and the memories of our youth! Actually we have been amazed at the quality of the sound on these discs. Sometimes far superior to current CDs; it's just a shame we have to keep getting up to change the disc! Tony and Graham are always delighted to show you around and even more delighted if you volunteer to help. Just give Tony a ring (651608) or Graham (07967189715) to meet them for a tour. They try to open regularly for an hour or so before our talks.

Meanwhile, work continues on our downstairs archive. We have been donated lots of material, ranging from family histories, house histories, past events, artefacts as diverse as a spinning wheel and a cricket cap and even a great collection of underclothes dating from the early twentieth century. Of course, it all needs cataloguing and sorting, and we are progressing well with this. Once it's all sorted and filed we then need to digitalise it, so it's a long job. Feel free to volunteer for this too!

#### Waveney Heritage at The Old School, Brockdish

We are also amassing a selection of books by local authors which you will be welcome to look at. When we have a chance we'll publish a list. In the meantime just ask to have a look.

Of course, we also provide a meeting venue for other groups, ranging from table tennis to crafts, and hold open days and craft fairs.

Do give me a ring if you require more details of our talks, have something you would like to donate, or to look at our collections. Remember, we have two lovely large rooms you can rent for a very reasonable £10 an hour, complete with kitchen, toilets, car parking, broadband and telephone.

#### **Royal Jubilees of the Past**

I am writing this just after our two village celebrations for the Platinum Jubilee. It was a memorable weekend wasn't it? Not sure how things went at the Thorpe Abbotts end as I was at the Brockdish party but the sun came out, a lot of cake was consumed and lots of people saw the Lancaster bomber flying low in a moving tribute. The recently rejuvenated Brockdish Common was looking great.



George III and Queen Charlotte

Royal Jubilees really started with George III's Golden Jubilee in October 1809. Although history has dismissed King George III primarily as the "mad" king responsible for the loss of America, a closer look at the 1780s and 90s at the heart of his reign, shows George III to be a particularly effective monarch, certainly no bungling idiot some scholars have dubbed him. He had early episodes of serious mental ill health from which he recovered but was not permanently mentally disabled until 1810. His general health however was not good and then of course he had to cope with the doctors, many of whom probably made him worse.

#### **Royal Jubilees of the Past**

The king's effectiveness stemmed from his immense popularity with ordinary people, which lay in direct contrast to his lack of popularity with Parliament. The people admire him largely due to his personal integrity and moral character, his happy marriage to Charlotte and his affection for his children and animals. His lack of popularity with Parliament was a result of his desire to choose his own Prime Minister, which parliament naturally felt was totally unacceptable and a retrograde step back to when earlier kings had exercised more autocratic powers. Parliament never gave in, I am pleased to say. Affectionately called Farmer George, because of his agricultural interests, it was natural to want to celebrate George's 50 years on the throne. They argued about the date, choosing oddly the onset of his 50th year rather than the completion but this may have been because of his health.


We don't know how our local villages celebrated but in London prices for candles began to rise in March 1809 as indoor celebrations were anticipated. Shops were closed on the day, 25 October, to allow for people's participation in festivities and the Lord Mayor of London and the City of London Corporation took part in a procession to St Paul's Cathedral, which culminated in a service of thanksgiving and later a dinner at the Mansion House. The king though, not feeling up to it all, stayed at Windsor after attending a private service and inspecting some troops.

At Norwich, in Yarmouth, in Bury and Ipswich there were grand dinners given by the mayors and impressive military parades. Prisoners were discharged from local jails (except the French prisoners of war) and money was distributed to the poor. And the tradition of putting up a memorial to the jubilee event began. Memorials naturally reflect the preoccupations of the day.

#### **Jubilee Memorials**

For George III's day in 1809, towers were all the rage. The Jubilee Tower at Moel Fammau on the top of the Clwydian Range, now sadly only half its intended size, was one of the largest. it has been restored recently but the obelisk shape on top has gone.

Statues were popular too. The Dunston Pillar, originally known as Dashwood's Lighthouse, stands six miles to the south of the City of Lincoln. With a spiral staircase inside and originally with a lantern on top reached by a surrounding balustraded gallery, it was erected in 1751 by Sir Francis Dashwood (of Hellfire Club fame) to guide travellers across the dark and desolate heathland and to attempt to deter highwaymen and, so it is said, to please his wife but the lighthouse fell into disuse and collapsed in a storm.

The Earl of Buckingham decided to replace the light with a statue of George III to celebrate the jubilee. A Lambeth stonemason named John Wilson, no doubt employed by the Coade works to fix the Coadestone statue of George III to the Pillar, fell from the top of the pillar to his death. He is buried in a local village. The pillar is still there but the statue was removed to Lincoln Castle in 1940 because of the danger to low flying aircraft.

One of the more eccentric memorials was a carving of a royal coat of arms on a great rock at Blisland, on Bodmin moor.

For Queen Victoria's jubilees in the 19th century, at the height of the industrial dominance of the UK, engineering and mechanical items seemed like a good way to celebrate, so jubilee memorials very often took the form of town clocks.

The grandest of clocks and clocktowers were constructed all over the Empire, many in India and what is now Malaysia but here in East Anglia we have some splendid examples. The Newmarket Jubilee clock was built to commemorate Queen Victoria's Golden Jubilee in 1887. Officially opened in 1890 the tower was paid for by local public subscription but the clock itself was donated by local racehorse trainer Charles Blandon and it is still wound by hand every week.

Queen Victoria was the first monarch to together her family to wave to the crowds on the Buckingham Palace Balcony, in her case in 1851 for the launch of the Great Exhibition. And every monarch since has followed her example.

But for her Platinum Jubilee, reflecting our 21st century concerns about the planet, our Queen specifically asked us to plant trees, and so that is what we did. Derek Clark and I planted crab apple trees for the Queen and for the planet on Brockdish Common, with a golden spade.



# Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus (Reviewed by Judith Chambers)

For a good holiday read, I would have no hesitation in recommending Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus. This is her debut novel and it is already a huge success. It is 'laugh out loud' humorous, tragic, heartfelt and thought provoking!

Set in the 1960's in California, it is the story of Elizabeth Zott, a research chemist and single mother to Madeline (very much frowned upon in the 60's) and owner of a dog with an extensive vocabulary. Elizabeth is determined to make her own way in life without being compromised. This determination causes all sorts of problems for her as a chemist at Hastings Research Institute and later, as the host of a very popular TV cooking show 'Supper At Six'.



Elizabeth wants more than anything to continue her research work. However her treatment at the hands of her male colleagues is simply appalling, from stealing her work to much worse..


I hope this book encourages you, perhaps to live more courageously with more kindness for yourself and others and to ask for help when you need it. Which is always a brave thing to do.....

#### A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations across the country will be remembered by everyone for ever. There were many celebrations enjoyed in all of our villages and towns, the weather was kind and this unique occasion will go down in history as one of our greatest ever. Thanks to all of the organisers and many volunteers that helped throughout the whole weekend.

Congratulations to the 100th Bomb Group Memorial Museum who have been awarded the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service. This is the highest award a local voluntary group can receive in the UK, and is equivalent to an MBE. This award was announced to coincide with the Queen's Platinum Jubilee on 2nd June 2022, and aims to recognise outstanding work by local volunteer groups to benefit their communities.

Electric vehicle charging points have been installed at Dickleburgh village centre as part of Norfolk County Council's electric vehicle strategy, which looks to cut carbon emissions by encouraging people to swap petrol and diesel cars for electric ones. NCC has pledged to achieve net zero carbon emissions by 2030, and unveiled its EV strategy last September to help reach that goal. By 2030, when sales of new diesel and petrol cars will be banned, it is expected there will be 168,279 electric vehicles (26.8% of the total), rising from 1,931 in 2019 (0.3%), so it essential that we have the appropriate infrastructure in place to support the increase in electric vehicles.

A 15-year vision for transport in Norfolk, including investment in cycling, walking and better bus services, has been set out by the County Council in its Local Transport Plan (LTP4). The LTP sets out the council's vision for improving transport between now and 2036, and is intended to encourage walking, cycling, bus and rail use, as well as delivering major projects such as the Norwich Western Link and the Long Stratton Bypass. Analysis of local and national data, and feedback from local people as part of the recent transport plan consultation, shows the need for both technological and social change to tackle the climate crisis.

#### A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

The plan helps to focus our goal and the actions we need to take while supporting all communities across the county in these challenging times. The LTP will be considered by all councillors in the July full council meeting.

An innovative training programme that helps teachers support the mental health of their pupils is being rolled out across all secondary schools in Norfolk. The "Rise Up" programme is a training course for teachers, which was founded in Norfolk and is now being trialled across 30 countries worldwide, including as far away as South Korea. Mental health and wellbeing is consistently highlighted as the issue that young people are most concerned about. By consistently providing early intervention strategies and learning, and identifying those young people who need help earlier, we can improve support, and we're confident this programme will help to deliver these aims.

I was pleased to attend the special "Pilgrim 400" apple tree planting at Harleston's new jubilee woodland, next to St Mary's Churchyard in Redenhall. It was good to see all of the trees that have already been planted there by the many volunteers involved with this project. I was also pleased to attend the official celebration of the restoration of Billingford Windmill, which is a major landmark here in the Waveney Valley. It has taken many years of hard work and securing the funding for this project, so again I thank all of the volunteers involved, and the organisations and local residents for their generous support.



#### **Thorpe Abbotts All Saints Church**

The main characteristic of this summer so far has been the lack of rain which has really impacted on the churchyard. The ground up there is very sandy/gravel so dries out very quickly. We did the Count of Nature at the beginning of June, which, apart from no Bee Orchids, the wildflower population has not really changed, although their size and numbers have. The Pyramidal Orchids, a feature of the eastern end of the churchyard, are still there in numbers although a good deal fewer than last year. A few facts about the Pyramidal Orchid: it was chosen as the county flower of the Isle of Wight, where it abounds on the island's chalk landscape. Like many orchids, it requires a specific fungus to be present in the soil in order to bloom.

Originally a flower of old, semi-natural chalk and limestone grasslands, including graveyards, the Pyramidal Orchid has shown liking for artificial а more environments in recent times. Colonies have appeared along motorways and ring-roads, canals, marinas. There is a nice population for instance, on the A140 roundabout the under A14. near Needham Market



Our regular service is always held on the second Sunday of the Month and a short evening service of Compline on the 4th Thursday, alternating with Billingford. Our next one will be in September.

Having the Church lit continues to be popular and we are delighted that you enjoy celebrating or remembering by having them on.
