Love food? Hate Waste? Check out the Community Fridge for Diss

A Community Fridge is a place where surplus food is shared within communities, a way of reducing waste and filling plates. Last year, the Co-op commissioned a live Christmas advert featuring Dermot O'Leary visiting a Community Fridge and announcing that funds would be available for communities to apply to develop a Community Fridge of their own. The following day, I copied the clip and made a Facebook post asking if there was any interest in doing this in our area. The response was overwhelming, so many offers of help and support. We formed a partnership, including interested local residents, Waveney Foodbank, Rotary Club of Diss and District, Diss Town Council and the Co-op, to develop the idea. The partnership progressed quickly. Waveney Foodbank found some funding, the Co-op provided some project management time and residents provided ideas and direction, Thinklusive provided identity design, and crucially, Diss Town Council offered a home for the Fridge & Freezer. Rotary Club of Diss District funded Food Hygiene training and Insurances and the Fridge and Freezer were installed at Diss Youth & Community Centre at the end of April.

We developed new partnerships with local food businesses and opened our doors on 23rd June. Since then, we have redistributed lots of food to lots of people. We have had over 100 unique visitors, many returning again. We haven't had time or resources to weigh the food that has been saved from the bin, please look at the videos on our Facebook page and have a guess!

The Fridge is run entirely by volunteers. We are always keen for people to join our team and have lots of ways for people to get involved - collecting surplus food, receiving surplus food, sharing their own surplus food, or even growing it. We are open on Monday, Thursday and Friday, 3-4pm for giving only, and 6:30-8pm for giving and taking. We're at Diss Youth and Community Centre on Shelfanger Road, please come and see us soon.


RoughCast Tour of Lovesong by Abi Morgan


Regenesis by George Monbiot reviewed by Adam Cobbold

Many of you will know George Monbiot for his outspoken views in relation to the natural environment, contemporary corporatised society, and what he feels must change for us to achieve a sustainable future, where human live in harmony, rather than in conflict with, nature. In this new book, he describes a world in which we are hurtling towards catastrophe and places the blame squarely at the door of intensive farming – what he calls the Global Standard Farm.

Having set the scene with a chapter devoted to soil ecology, he advocates a more thorough understanding of it as a necessary prerequisite for any kind of progress towards sustainable food production. With the world facing 10bn people this century, 'agricultural sprawl' will accompany population growth to leave the planet desolate. He looks at alternative farming methods and then moves on to the possibility of using bacterial fermentation to make a high protein flour entirely artificially, as an alternative to meat and cereals. He asserts that bacterial proteins would need 1700 times less land to produce the same level of protein. By embracing these new methods and proposing a fundamental change to the eating habits of the human race, a partial rewilding of existing farmland can occur, and toxic agricultural sprawl can be halted and

His book is a meticulously researched and fascinating insight into farming and proposals for change, although, as ever, it has an angle. Don't expect impartiality, and don't expect too much realism. It is highly idealistic, and a hugely ambitious proposition. Even with new technologies, the cultural change required looks extremely unlikely to happen. But it is deeply informative and another truly captivating and highly detailed presentation from him.







A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

Winter Travel Information

I would like to express our thanks to the team that deliver Norfolk's highway services, often working day and night throughout the winter months. They recently celebrated winning the Highways Winter Maintenance Award 2022. This national award recognises the hard work of the team, and in particular, their use of innovative technology. We are well prepared to help keep Norfolk moving over the coming months, with all of Norfolk's salt domes fully stocked. Each full 3-hour gritting run in Norfolk sees 2,200 miles of road treated. All A and B-class roads, and some C-class roads, are treated, with a focus on commuter and major bus routes, and, as far as possible, one route into all villages. The A11 and A47 are gritted by National Highways. People can check which roads are on the council's gritting routes for the 2022/23 season on the map at www.norfolk.gov.uk/gritting. On the same map, people can find the locations of around 1,900 grit bins that are filled by the County Council, and which people can use on public pavements, cycle paths and roads to help everyone get around safely. Also, thanks to all of the farmers around the county that help to keep our roads clear of snow when we have heavy snowfalls.

The Department of Education have awarded NCC £4.7 million of funding as part of the Multiply project, which aims to improve numeracy skills in adults. The funding will last until the end of March 2025 and will be used to give grants to major training providers, such as Norfolk Adult Learning and colleges, as well as smaller organisations and grassroot providers. This grant-based approach means a larger number of people can take a course which is relevant to the skills they need. The council has also taken on 7 Multiply Champions, who will work with district and borough councils to provide advice and support to people looking to improve their numeracy skills and understanding. The Champions will attend local events and work in various community areas, such as libraries, to ensure they reach people who would benefit from a Multiply funded course. Norfolk Apprenticeships

Apprenticeships Norfolk, a free and impartial service run by NCC, offers a wide range of support for both apprentices and companies looking to take on an apprentice, including information and guidance, as well as financial support. The Access to Apprenticeships grant, which is funded through the European Regional Development Fund, offers businesses up to £500 to enable them to overcome barriers to hiring an apprentice. The grant can be used for a variety of things, such as providing travel expenses, or the technology required by an apprentice to complete their studies, or for purchasing specialist equipment which would be needed, but can present a barrier to companies thinking of hiring an apprentice. Apprenticeships Norfolk has been running the #MadeinNorfolk campaign, aimed at encouraging businesses to take on an apprentice or to upskill an existing staff member using an apprenticeship. The campaigns success was recently recognised at the regional Chartered Institute of Public Relations awards, winning both the Best Low Budget campaign and the Best Public Sector information campaign categories. Winter Capacity Plan

More than 3,000 extra hours of extra home care are being commissioned this winter to help support growing demand on Adult Social Care. It is one of several measures NCC is taking alongside its partners in the NHS to help cope with the repercussions of Covid, which have created an "extraordinary" situation across health and social care this winter. There has been a 67% increase on pre-Covid levels on the proportion of people needing care when they leave hospital, and this comes amid national workforce shortages. In response, the council has worked with its partners in health to put in place a range of measures, outlined in its Winter Capacity Plan. This includes: commissioning additional block provision, opening up the home care framework and working with new providers, the offer of an enhanced home care discharge rate for providers accepting individuals being discharged

from hospital, and commissioning of additional double up capacity. Alongside housing providers (Broadland and Saffron Housing) and the integrated Care Board, the council is also making use of Housing with Care flats, as part of a Community Step Down model to help reduce hospital stays.



Meals in a Bowl

Smoked Cod and Sweetcorn Chowder (serves 6)

130g (4½ oz) cubed pancetta

50g (2oz) butter

3 leeks 450g (1lb), trimmed and thinly sliced

25g (1oz) plain flour

1 pint semi or full fat milk

700g (1½ lb) smoked cod/haddock, cut into cubes

326g can sweetcorn in water, drained

450g (1lb) small potatoes, scrubbed and sliced

150ml (1/4 pint) double cream

1/2 tsp paprika

Chopped parsley to garnish



Fry the pancetta until the fat runs. Add the butter, then the leeks, and cook until softened. Stir in the flour and cook for a few seconds, then pour in the milk and 300ml (½ pint) of cold water. Stir until smooth. Add the fish, potatoes and sweetcorn. Bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and simmer for 10-15 mins until the potatoes are cooked. Stir in the cream, season with salt and pepper and cook for 2-3mins. Ladle into bowls and decorate with parsley.

Pepper and Lentil Soup

1 tbsp oil 2 red peppers, seeded and diced

1 medium onion, chopped 225g (8oz) red lentils

1 celery stick, chopped 400g tin chopped tomatoes

1 carrot, chopped 1 litre (1¾ pint) hot light vegetable stock

1 leek, trimmed and chopped 25g pack flat leaf parsley, chopped

Heat the oil in a pan and add the onion, celery, leek and carrot. Cook for 10-15 minutes until soft. Add the red peppers and cook for 5 mins. Stir in the lentils, tomatoes and hot stock, and season. Cover the pan and bring to the boil, then reduce the heat and cook uncovered for 25 minutes until the lentils and vegetables are tender. Stir in the parsley and serve with toast.
