Waveney Volunteers for Nature

Work continues on both commons, and we are pleased to hear the many comments appreciating what is being done and the enjoyment the community is getting from it. On the prospects for the old school playing field, there are two pieces of news. Firstly, it transpires that, contrary to local folklore, the land was not donated to the school, but was actually purchased by Norfolk County Council, so that puts a bit more of a problem in our way. The Parish Council has, however, applied to register the land as an 'Asset of Community Value' which gives the community the first option to make a bid for the land if and when it is put up for sale. Secondly, the County Council has gone quiet in its responses, but we have picked up on the development that the County Council has been given £1/3m to prepare a 'Local Nature Recovery Strategy', and so we have made the case that the old playing field and adjoining the common could contribute to that strategy. We'll keep trying!

Our first AGM will take place on 10th October at the Waveney Heritage Centre. Everyone is welcome to join us for the evening, to hear about our progress and to contribute any ideas or views that they have.

We have also been taking an interest in 'BeeLine', which is a scheme for developing the connectivity between gardens and green areas in a community, thereby helping our wildlife. When we have explored this further we'll see if this is something that could be adopted in Brockdish. As always, your views would be welcomed.

And see what happens in the world when I'm 86.


I know dear Lord! It's much to ask (And it must be nice in heaven) But I would really like to stay until I'm 87

And Now for Something Different: National Rat Week 6-13 November 1939 to World Rat Day 2023 Local History by Elaine Murphy

Browsing through the archives of the Diss Express, looking for inspiration, I could not help but be struck by a headline advertising a nationwide week of destruction of rats just after the outset of World War Two in October 1939. Voracious destroyers of grain stocks, it was estimated (not sure how) that rats, caused over £100 million worth of damage annually to food stocks. This was later revised to £70m, a month later to £60m. Truth is, noone had any idea but clearly rats were a perpetual menace.

A public information campaign persuaded farmers and everyone who stored grain and other foodstuffs to kill rats especially, but also mice. The Ministry published a special leaflet, after passing a bill in 1919 to encourage the extermination of rats. Bulletin no. 30, gave guidance on how to tackle large numbers of these unwelcome 'critters'.

It was the job of the local sanitary inspector to persuade farmers to organise rat hunts with dogs, ferrets and guns. But mostly poison was used, especially Red Squill (the powdered bulbs of a Mediterranean plant, urginea maritima), since the toxic action was relatively specific to rats, but also some less targeted poisons like barium carbonate and phosphorus laced bait, (Rodine was one brand), not at all friendly to other wildlife.

And Now for Something Different: National Rat Week 6-13 November 1939 to World Rat Day 2023

This was not the first 'rat week'. It had been tried before with varying degrees of success since the late 19th century. How much it all cost is not recorded, nor whether the special weeks had made any difference. No statistics were collected, noone had a clue whether excess rats had been exterminated during rat week or not. The Minister of Health certainly didn't know, but it did not stop the government from planning further weeks in subsequent years. In 1922, an MP, Dr Addison, asked the Minister of Health for numbers, but Sir W Davison Bt, the Health Minister, could only say "It is believed that the efforts of last November resulted in heavy casualties". Sceptical, Dr Addison replied "In view of the elaborate circular sent out by the Ministry to the local authorities, does the Right Honorable Gentleman not think it would be desirable to have some rather better statistics than he has presented to the House this afternoon?", adding "If the Hon. Baronet can suggest any way by which we can count the rats poisoned in their holes, I shall be glad to know of it.

Clearly feeling a little mischievous, a new MP, Will Thorne, one of the first Labour members and a Trade Union activist, asked "Have all the rats roaming in and about this House been killed yet?"

A little rumble of amusement went round the chamber, but the minister did not rise to this particular bait.

The local public health committee for Depwade was highly sceptical of this official initiative, especially when Norfolk County Council announced they would pay tuppence a carcase (i.e. two old pennies) for every rat killed and presented in one piece, which the Ministry had specifically warned against, since the 'incentive' merely led to a hiatus in normal vermin eradication until the right week came round. Mr Easey on Hartismere Rural District Council suggested the local council should not cooperate because rats needed to be exterminated at all times, not just once a year and someone else pointed out that there were bushel sacks of dead rats that Hartismere Hospital boiler house had promised to burn and no-one was getting 2d a head for them. The scheme was bound to fail. Nevertheless, the scheme went ahead, although sadly we don't learn how much was paid out in total for rat carcases.

And Now for Something Different: National Rat Week 6-13 November 1939 to World Rat Day 2023

In earlier eras, rat infestations attracted the new trade of Rat-Catchers. By the Victorian era, it was common knowledge that rats carried diseases, and thousands of them were known to infest sewers, factories and homes, as well as rural housing and farms. In the seasons when rats overran London, rat catchers were in high demand. "One pair of rats ... with their progeny, will produce in three years no less a number than 646,808 rats, which will consume day by day as much food as 64,680 men, leaving eight rats to starve". To solve the rat problem, the demand for rat catchers was high and children were often employed. Many children preferred catching rats to cleaning chimneys, working in coal mines, or hawking wares. One reason rat catching was popular with youth was because it was lucrative. De-ratting English manors, wealthy houses and businesses earned rat-catchers wages that ranged from two shillings to one pound. But rat-catchers had to make an investment in at least a terrier or a ferret, so many rat-catchers were older youths. But let's move on. Times change. Now it seems we must decide whether rats are friend or foe.



For some at least, the rat has become man's new best friend (although not in our house!) According to the publicity for 'Rat Awareness Week 2023, "Rats are friendly, intelligent and engaging companions. They are not nocturnal, which means they are feeling sociable when you are too". According to the Pet Food Manufacturers' Association, there are approximately 100,000 pet rats in the UK. There are as many rats as there are gerbils so many owners are enjoying their companionship.

And Now for Something Different: National Rat Week 6-13 November 1939 to World Rat Day 2023

"Rats are amazing animals with some amazing talents and qualities. Rats have suffered a bad reputation since the bubonic plague and people usually despise rats for stealing food and spreading diseases. But, those who have pet rats know that they are intelligent animals who are fun to be with. They need attention, care, and love, just like any other living being. In 2002, a group of pet enthusiasts started World Rat Day to create acceptance of these wonderful animals, allowing them to be part of our everyday lives."

So if rats are your thing, save 4th April 2024 and celebrate, you've missed this year. Please let the author know how rats are enriching your lives with their 'talents'. Meanwhile, the Brockdish adventurers who try every autumn to make a home in our barns and roof will be greeted with the same welcome as usual, but if anyone wants to adopt one, contact the Editor.

The Book Club recommends...



A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

Along with many others, I recently attended the official opening of The Toddler Play Area on Harleston Rec. It was opened by The Lord Lieutenant for Norfolk, The Lady Dannatt MBE, who made the day very special by commenting about Harleston's resilience throughout the Covid pandemic, the tremendous community spirit in the town, and thanking the many local volunteers for what they do. There were many toddlers there to help Lady Dannatt with the cutting of the ribbon and to show us all how they use and enjoy the new equipment. A special thanks to Harleston Town Council, all of its staff and everyone else involved with this project.

The final round of LED upgrades to Norfolk County Council's Street Lighting is underway, cutting CO_2 emissions by over 200 tonnes a year. The work, which will replace traditional High Intensity Discharge (HID) lighting with the latest generation of LED lanterns, will take place over the next 24 months, and involve replacing 16,800 HID lights with LEDs. When complete, 100% of NCCs streetlighting will use low energy LEDs. The final phase of the move to low energy LEDs will save an estimated 1,099,032 kWh of energy per year, equating to approximately £380,000 p.a. at current electricity prices. This represents an estimated carbon saving of 227 tonnes of carbon dioxide emissions each year as a result of the final stage of switching from HID to LED streetlighting.

With the bird nesting season over, people across Norfolk have a chance to do their bit to stop flooding and keep water flowing across their properties. Small, simple steps that ensure water can drain away from your home can cut down the likelihood of flooding, starting with tasks as simple as keeping drains, ditches, and watercourses clear and able to flow freely. After a years growth, many ditches and watercourses will benefit from clearing branches, and cutting back new undergrowth. Now bird nesting season is over, early autumn is the prime time for property owners to put in a little work to keep their properties safe. Outside the home, if residents spot any blocked or Norfolk's highways they can drains report broken on www.norfolk.gov.uk/flooding, allowing Norfolk's Highways Team to clear them and keep our roads open. Also, now is the time of year to cut back your hedges and trees away from footpaths and the roadside so that people can use the footpaths safely and that vehicles can use the whole width of the roads.

A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

Norfolk's £3bn tourism industry is to get an annual boost of more than £100,000 a year in the hope this will inject millions of pounds more into the county. County Hall agreed to the increased spend as part of hopes to become part of a new initiative that could unlock more Westminster cash which the county cannot currently bid for. Pete Waters, executive director of Visit East of England, said: "I'd like to thank NCC for this investment in tourism services. This will ultimately benefit and support our local destinations and businesses, the stars in our tourism firmament". It is hoped the new initiative could create 9,700 further jobs connected to tourism, and help make Norfolk one of the top destinations in the country for visitors.

NCCs award-winning Adult Education Services offers free part-time one year courses for students aged 19 or over who do not have a 1-9 in GCSE English and/or Maths. Last year 111 people took GCSEs with the service, 84% of maths GCSE students achieved Grade 4 or above and 73% of English GCSE students achieved grade 4 or above. The service also offers a range of other courses including access courses for learners of all ages which are available on a flexible basis during the day, evening, or online. Speeding in Brockdish

As residents are aware, speeding through the village has become more of an issue in the last couple of years. This has resulted in more visits from the Norfolk Constabulary Speed Safety Team. Previous data from the speed cameras did confirm there was a speeding problem.

The figures for the site at Brockdish are as follows.

15/06/2023: 5 offences (of which 4 were from Brockdish addresses)

15/07/2023: 5 offences (of which 2 were from Brockdish addresses)

18/07/2023: 4 offences (of which 2 were from Brockdish addresses)

25/07/2023: 3 offences (0 Brockdish address)

04/08/2023: 7 offences (of which 2 were from Brockdish addresses)

18/08/2023: 4 offences (0 Brockdish addresses)

27/08/2023: 2 offences (0 Brockdish addresses)

Therefore, in 7 visits, lasting approximately 45 mins each, a total of 26 speeding fines have been given out. 10 of those were issued to residents of Brockdish. That is just under 40%.

Helping Wildlife

Butterflies are becoming scarcer, there are fewer garden birds, and bees are dying out due to harmful agrochemicals and habitat loss. We all have the chance to help wildlife, creating areas for habitation and to provide food.

Bees enjoy open types of flowers that they can fly straight into. It is best to choose plants that flower as much of the year as possible, including early flowers such as Helleborus and Mahonia which are crucial sources of nectar when there is not much else. Bee keeping is very popular nowadays, and helps to keep the honeybee population healthy. Logs drilled with holes are good for solitary bees, and bumble bee nest boxes can be bought or made.

A pond will encourage frogs and newts to visit, and also a multitude of insects, which are food for birds and amphibians alike. Shady, moist patches of low perennials will help frogs and toads if a pond is not possible. Rotting logs near amphibious habitation will become "insect hotels".

To encourage butterflies, you may want to provide food for the little munching caterpillars. Stinging nettles and thistles are firm favourites. Butterfly boxes can be bought or made with long slits, where butterflies can enter. These have lots of rough surfaces inside for them to hibernate.

Garden shrubs and trees produce berries for birds to fill up on in the autumn and winter. It is important for gardens to have flowers that encourage insects for birds to eat, and that have enough space for building nests. Teasel and sunflower are great for seed-eating birds, whereas honeysuckle produces berries in autumn, provides shelter in winter and has flowers that attract insects in the spring and summer. A lot of bird-friendly plants are good for hedging and are useful for the gardener.
