


The Book Club recommends...

Regenesis by George Monbiot

Reviewed by Derek Clark

This is a book about how the world feeds itself, about rapidly developing problems and about a solution. Dry it is not. From the start, when George digs up a half spit of earth and analyses it forensically, it's as good as any science fiction. But there's a purpose to it: his solution lies in the soil, one of the richest ecosystems on Earth. There is an extensive review of our present food production system and the looming problems, all presented with riveting facts and some humour. His exposure of the world's food production system. controlled by just a few organisations and trade routes, explains how vulnerable we are to events - just as the recent glitch in a computer system caused world-wide deadlock. Then he looks at what agriculture is doing to the soil; compacting it, over-draining it, and killing it with chemicals, so that even weeds are becoming immune to herbicides. As to the production of 66 million chickens a year, and the pollution that it causes he's absolutely scathing. This explains a large part of the problem we now see in a dying River Waveney. The problems of the ever increasing land take for products like soya and palm oil are his next worry, including, for example, the unexpected consequences of clearing the Amazon forests which now results in a 9000 mile belt of seaweed from the Gulf of Mexico to the west coast of Africa

But the mood lightens as George visits farms where methods of old are being revisited with great success. Then he moves on to bacteria. There is an account of the the process to produce microbial protein and his reaction to eating his first pancake made with what amounts to a new form of flour. He convincingly reasons how this could replace farming as we know it and allow the planet to return largely to a wild state with much of our excess carbon reabsorbed. The argument is also well made that if we were starting from now we would certainly not design the food production system that we have today. But then we know people don't like change, so it will take a lot of creative chefs to produce food made from microbial protein that we all can accept and enjoy. Although, if you already eat cheese or yoghurt you are halfway there! It's worth a read.





A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

Congratulations to everyone that was involved with organising the "Masters of the Air" day in Thorpe Abbotts. It was the perfect day, one of those days that you will always remember. Well done to you all.

All Town and Parish Councils across the county have been contacted by NCC with details regarding our popular Parish Partnership Scheme which has been running for the last ten years. The County Council has provisionally allocated £300,000 on a 50/50 basis. There is an upper limit on NCC funding support of £25,000 to fund schemes put forward by Town and Parish Councils to deliver projects that are priorities for local communities. We are particularly keen to encourage and support first-time bids. Acceptable schemes for funding would be: small lengths of formal footway, trods (a simplified and low-cost footway), improved crossing facilities, improvements to Public Rights of Way, flashing signs to tackle speeding (Speed Awareness Mobile Signs SAM2), part-time 20mph signs with flashing warning lights outside schools, new bus shelters or shelter lighting, and electric vehicle charging points.

Recent road safety figures shows that 42% of all driver-related traffic incidents in Norfolk are caused by driver distraction and a loss of concentration at the wheel. To help influence driver behaviour and enable more people to travel to their destinations safely, Norfolk County Council Public Health's Safety team have partnered with Driver iQ, Norfolk Police, Norfolk Fire and Rescue, East of England Ambulance Service and experts in behaviour change to launch a Stay Focused Campaign, offering businesses and drivers to free online training, and resources to improve focus whilst driving. The Stay Focused resources are available at www.norfolk.gov.uk/stayfocused, and show you how you can train your brain to keep your mind alert whilst driving. It includes a quiz developed by the Open University to test how focused you are when you drive.

Bus passenger figures continue to rise across Norfolk. Latest figures from bus operators across Norfolk show that the number of passengers has increased by 12% for the first quarter of this financial year. There were more than 6.9 million journeys taken by bus during April, May and June 2024 compared to 6.1 million for the same period in 2023. This follows the figures released in April, which confirmed an annual rise of 16% for April 2023 to March 2024. It is now two years since NCC received £49.55 m of funding from the DfT to improve bus services across the county and increase number of journeys made by bus.

A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

Great Yarmouth's Herring Bridge has scooped a national award. Herring Bridge, which was constructed by BAM Farrans Joint Venture for NCC has won Road Bridge of the year at the inaugural New Civil Engineer Bridges Awards. Herring Bridge, Great Yarmouth's third river crossing, is a nationally significant infrastructure project, designed to ease traffic congestion, improve journey reliability and generate investment and regeneration in the town and wider borough. The Road Bridge Project of the Year sought to recognise excellence in new build or major road refurbishment project in the UK, in the last year.

Now that the bird nesting season has finished may I remind people to cut their trees and hedges back that are growing into the highway and over public footpaths, which will improve the safety for everyone.

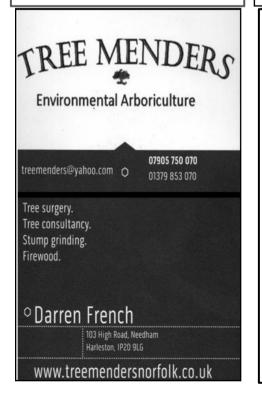

Jobs for Autumn

- Help your pumpkins ripen by supporting them on bricks.
- Store harvested apples in a cool place, 3-7°C
- Prune blackberries, cutting out all the fruited canes, and tie in new growth.
- Move evergreen shrubs, divide summer flowering perennials, sow broad beans.
- Cut down the foliage of Jerusalem artichokes to 8cm stumps. As they tend to spread divide if necessary
- Bring in your root veg. Carrots and beetroot should be layered in moist sand and stored in a cool dark frost free place
- Plant Autumn onions
- Wildlife in the garden enjoy windfalls, but remove them from the lawn.
 Try not to cut down seed heads. Ivy flowering this time of the year is a
 useful late source of nectar for pollinators. Rowan and hazel produce
 food for wildlife, and autumn is the time to plant them. Make home for
 wildlife by putting up nest and insect boxes.

Knit a Poppy for the Royal British Legion

Many of you will have seen the knitted displays on top of Thorpe Abbotts post box, or the wonderful sea of knitted poppies that adorns Dickleburgh Church at this time of year. This Remembrance Day, why not start our own Remembrance Yarn Bomb for our own community? These poppies are quick and easy to knit. Don't spend a fortune on knitting supplies either; charity shops, especially the Blg C in Diss, have great ranges of wool and needles that you can pick up for a few pence. If you can't remember how to knit, Youtube has lots of great step-by-step videos, or pop along to Harleston Library for their Knit, Stitch and Chat sessions for expert advice. Easy garter/knit stitch pattern for beginners

Colour A Red (one ball will make a lot of poppies!)
Colour B Scrap of Black or a black button

Body of Poppy

Using Col A cast on 120 stitches.

Rows 1-4 Knit

Row 5 Knit 3 stiches together across the

row(40 stiches)

Rows 6-9 Knit

Row 10 Knit 2 stitches together across the row(20 stitches)

Rows 11-14 Knit

Row 15 Knit 2 stitches together across the row(10 stitches)

Cut yarn leaving a tail of about 20 cm. Thread tail through yarn needle and slip all the remaining live stitches onto the yarn tail and pull tight. Pull around into a circle and then mattress stitch (or use whatever stitching you normally use) to seam for an invisible seam. Sew in ends.

Centre of Poppy

Using Col B, cast on 16 sts. Cast off. Coil into a tight spiral and sew base to the centre. Or use a black or green button with 4 holes and sew to centre of poppy. Add pin.

Autumnal Sweet Treats

Pumpkin Pie with Pecan and Maple Cream

550g pumpkin, peeled and cut into chunks 500g packet of shortcrust pastry 175g light muscovado sugar

2 eggs

150ml double cream

1 tsp cinnamon

1tsp ground ginger



For the cream:
150ml double cream
5 tbsps maple syrup
25g finely chopped pecans

Microwave the pumpkin pieces on high for 15 mins or until soft, and set aside to cool. Line a 25cm tart tin with the pastry, making sure there is an overhang, and chill for 30 mins. Bake blind at 200°C/180°C fan/gas 6 for 15-20 mins. Remove the lining foil and baking beans, and bake for a further 10 minutes until golden. Turn the oven down to 160°C/140°C fan/gas 3.

Place the cooled pumpkin, sugar, eggs, cream and spices in a food processor and blend until smooth. Pour into the pastry case and cook for 1 hour. It will puff up but sink as it cools. Remove from the tin and cool.

Whip the cream with the maple syrup, stir in the nuts and serve spoonfuls with the pie.

Baked Apples with Prunes, Cinnamon and Ginger

Serves 4. Preheat oven 200°C/180°C fan/gas 6

4 cooking apples, cored 50g light muscovado sugar

2 balls of stem ginger, finely chopped ½ tsp cinnamon

4 prunes, chopped 1 tbsp butter

Score a line around each apple and put into a baking dish with a splash of water. Combine the sugar, ginger, prunes and cinnamon, and stuff the mixture into the apples so they are well packed. Top each apple with a knob of butter and bake for 35-40 mins until tender. Remove from the oven and baste the apples in the liquid left in the pan. Serve hot or cold with ice cream.

"Show me your faith without deeds and I will show you my faith by what I do" (Cf. James 2:14-26 NIV). St James makes it clear that faith, real faith, is expressed by action. So if you believe, what difference does your faith make to the way that you live your life? Too often, faith is regarded as a purely private thing; something hidden away and protected from prying eyes. True, your faith is your business; I have no right to insist that you believe the same as me. But if you are a Christian, I do have the right to remind you of scripture. In fact, it is my job.

So, I hope you agree that faith has to be practical. That said, there are many ways of putting faith into practice. Faith can be expressed through being more caring to family, friends and strangers.
