



If you or someone you know are **PARTIALLY SIGHTED or BLIND**, and still enjoy live performance, you might be interested in our Audio Description at Players productions, and we would love to hear from you. It is completely free, and we can let you know when it is available at our productions. Please contact us with an e-mail or phone number so you won't miss out.

We started this last year with 'Dads Army', and this year with our 'Farndale Christmas Carol'. We provide a small receiver with an earpiece giving live description of what is happening on stage so you can enjoy the show.

We have developed this with the help of local therapist and counsellor Tracy Reeve who is herself blind. Tracy says, "I always enjoyed going to the theatre and since losing my sight I am delighted that Players are now providing this service. Audio Description is very rare in local theatre, and I am pleased to help with the refining of the description. This helps me to understand and really enjoy the performances. Please support this service to make sure it will continue."

Our next production is 'These Shining Lives'. This tells the true story of four women who worked for the Radium Dial factory in Illinois in the 1920s/30s, and their legal battle to prove that many health problems were caused by their work conditions. They suffered radium poisoning, but their employers denied responsibility. A brilliant show. The Audio Description will be available at both performances on May 3rd, and can be booked through me.



Walking in The Waveney Valley

The Peace of Wild Things by Wendell Berry

When despair for the world grows in me and I wake in the night at the least sound in fear of what my life and my children's lives may be, I go and lie down where the wood drake rests in his beauty on the water, and the great heron feeds. I come into the peace of wild things who do not tax their lives with forethought of grief. I come into the presence of still water. And I feel above me the day-blind stars waiting with their light. For a time I rest in the grace of the world and am free.

I love this poem, it inspires me to get out into the countryside and explore the beautiful Waveney Valley. This in turn encourages me to write. Here is some of my walking diary from the last year or two.

<u>May</u>

The wind is strong today. Larks are rising. The curve of the field is like the curve of the earth. Clouds are scraped and stippled across the blue sky and there are so many shades of green; the blue-green of the stands of wheat turn yellow-green as I turn my head to face the sun. The green-grey of the hawthorn is encrusted with pink and white blossom, the bracts drooping heavily. The dead tree trunk I have found to sit on is alive with biting flies soaking up the sun and leaving my blood to flow safely in its veins. The old tree stump is gnarled, grey, deeply veined and sharp-edged. Larks continue to rise. Behind me, rosebay and nettles droop in the heat. I have no idea where I am or how to get back home, though I know I'm not lost. Larks continue to rise. Cow parsley seems to float on the wind which speaks and creaks through the woods behind like rushing water. My friend Anne told me today she'd had a bee swarm in her garden and an old bee-keeper came round to gently tap and drop them into a box and take them home with him to make new honey. A crow flies across the top of the field into the wood, I hear it gently cawing, a counterpoint to the hiss of the wind. From here the track curves round the edge of the field and out of sight - I shall follow it to see where it leads me.


Small Pleasures by Clare Chambers

It is 1957, and Jean Swinney, a spinster in her late 30s, lives with her neurotic widowed mother in the suburbs of South East London. Jean is the only female journalist on the North Kent Echo and therefore – to her dismay – given the onerous task of writing weekly columns on housekeeping and gardening tips. Trapped in a life of duty and disappointment from which there is no likelihood of escape, Jean takes solace in small pleasures: "... the first cigarette of the day; a glass of sherry before Sunday lunch; a bar of chocolate parcelled out to last a week ... the satisfaction of a neatly folded ironing pile."

Things begin to look up for Jean when the editor sends her to investigate a Mrs Gretchen Tilbury – "Our Lady of Sidcup" – who sensationally claims that her daughter is the product of a virgin birth. The evidence appears to confirm Gretchen's version of events, but as Jean accompanies Gretchen and the ten-year-old Margaret to tests at Charing Cross Hospital, she finds herself becoming increasingly involved in the Tilbury family, including Gretchen's husband, Howard, and her professional detachment is compromised as she begins to suspect the truth about Margaret's conception.

Small Pleasures is, as its title hints, a novel about people who have settled for lives that are less than they'd hoped for, but with a typically English middle-class sense that they mustn't grumble. The war and its deprivations are only a decade past. People are making do and mending but there are bigger passions and unspoken sorrows buried under the respectable surface that threaten to derail a life, especially in a society that expects women to behave in a certain way.

Small Pleasures is a rare treat of a book. Small lives, love and loneliness, wit, despair and unexpected mystery all wrapped up in a time of pea-soupers, spam fritters and stifling 1950s mores.



A word from Rosedale.....

This form of recycling is also good for the planet.

For those who are bereaved, a new year is often not a cause for celebration but a reminder that the future must be faced without their loved one. For some, this fear can be quite overwhelming.

At our bereavement groups, we like to remind participants that they do still have a future (even though it might look very different to what they had planned.) None of us know the future or what good times may lie ahead. We also remind our participants that they are still individuals of worth (even without their loved one) and they are still important - friends, family, colleagues etc, still need them.

No matter our circumstances, we all have something to offer. We each have a unique set of skills, characteristics and abilities that are needed in the world.



Most importantly, we all need to be reminded that we are not alone. Everyone is part of some kind of community, whether that be a family, a friendship group, neighbourhood, church, workplace or hobby club. At the most basic level, we are all part of the human race and have a part to play in making the world a better place.

A word from Rosedale.....

I'll finish with a little story...... Whilst looking at some of the comments beneath an Instagram post about mental health, a doctor had commented that he was losing hope and didn't feel his life had a point anymore. I encouraged him to keep going and that I believed he had a unique combination of skills and abilities that no one else had. I reminded him that the world needed what he had to give. He replied with 'Thank you, I really needed to hear this today.'

We don't know what difficult situations someone else might be facing but we can all do a little something that might make a big difference- a smile, a helping hand, a kind word, or an act of generosity.

Intriguing Places to Visit By Susan Sindall

David Parr House, 186 Gwydir Street, Off Mill Road, Cambridge

From the outside, 186 Gwydir Street looks like any other small Victorian terraced house, but step inside and an extraordinary hand painted Arts and Craft interior awaits.

David Parr began work at 17 years of age as an apprentice at the Cambridge firm of J R Leach, master decorators, in 1871. He decorated some of the grandest houses in the area, and was introduced to the work of the most famous designers of the time including Charles Kempe, renowned for stained glass, George Bodley, who restored numerous churches, and William Morris, whose designs remain popular today. David stayed with the firm for 50 years. In 1886, he had saved enough to buy his own home, where he and his wife, Mary, raised three children and lived for the rest of their lives.

Little by little, year by year, David transformed the entire house by restructuring and painting it in the style he worked on in his professional life. The walls and ceilings of the home are testament to his immense skill and dedication. He also designed and made items of joinery and we can still see the notebook in which he detailed every aspect of his work. Although in the style of the rich and famous, David's work is uniquely personal and adapted to make a comfortable and beautiful home for his family. His initials can be seen intertwined into his design in the hallway.

Intriguing Places to Visit

Remarkably, thanks to his wife, and then his granddaughter, Elsie Palmer, who lived in the house for 80 years without changing anything, the interior has survived intact. The house is also an invaluable piece of social history, with very minimal alterations over the years. The toilet dates from late 19th century, and the oven from the 1920's. The house was 'discovered' in 2009, and work began to purchase and preserve it. After 10 years of fundraising and many dedicated volunteer hours, the house opened to the public in 2019. The size of the property means that all visits must be booked in advance. Timed slots are available on Thursdays, Fridays and Saturdays at a cost of £15 per person, with guided tours and group bookings available on other days. There is a very small gift shop, and on the day I visited there was a small exhibition staged by students from the Anglia Ruskin University, inspired by a careful study of the house. There is no cafe but there is a very popular coffee house just across the street And all a 10 minute walk from the station!



A message from Councillor Martin Wilby

Norfolk is set to gain new powers and funding following a significant Government announcement on 5th February 2025. Norfolk would be a priority area for devolution and local Government reform. As part of this, the Government is seeking to create a devolution deal for Norfolk and Suffolk, which would include the introduction of an elected mayor. In addition, there are plans to reshape local government in Norfolk. The Government intends to replace the current two-tier structure, where services are shared between county and district councils, with unitary authorities. This would centralize decision-making and service delivery into a single authority, streamlining local government processes and potentially increasing efficiency and saving taxpayers money. These changes will empower local areas with more control over their services and funding. Norfolk has launched new grant programmes as part of its five-year economic blueprint. The £1.1m Business Growth Fund offer grants of £5k to £50k, covering up to 30% of project costs. The £1.2m Made Smarter Adoption programme will provide grants of up to £20k, funding up to 50% of advanced manufacturing and engineering projects. These initiatives aim to boost key sectors like clean energy, agri-tech, and research, while unlocking private sector investment. Grants will be available from April 2025. A scheme to support people in Norfolk with long-term health issues get back into employment or continue in their jobs has already helped more than 1,100 participants. The Working Well Norfolk programme, launched in October 2023, supports individuals with long-term health issues to return to or stay in work. It has already helped over 1,100 participants, with 200 moving into work and 150 staying employed despite health challenges. The programme has received 1,600 referrals and will continue for another 18 months, with additional funding to help 730 more people, totalling 1,830 participants by September 2026. Norfolk Youth Justice Service (NYJS) has received an overall rating of "good" after an inspection by His Majesty's Inspectorate of Probation (HMIP), describing staff as "motivated" and "creative" going "above and beyond" to support the children they work with. The report followed a recent visit by

inspectors. NYJS is a multi-agency partnership hosted within Norfolk County Council's Children's Services. Its aim is to prevent children from offending, help them repair the damage they cause victims and help children achieve their potential. The inspection found the governance of Norfolk YJS to be strong, with an experienced independent chair of the management board, who is "skilled and knowledgeable." The quality of resettlement policy and provision was separately rated as "outstanding"



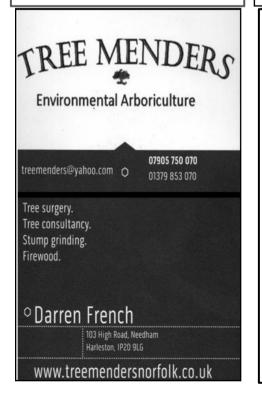

A Celebration of Rhubarb

Rhubarb is ready to harvest when the stems are thick and long enough, usually in late April/early May. Gently twist the stem at the base of the plant and pull the stem from the plant. Discard the leaves, which are poisonous, onto your compost heap or brown bin. Rhubarb is a good source of vitamin K, vitamin C and potassium.

Rhubarb and Custard Crumble Bars (Serves 8)

Preparation time 10 minutes, Cooking time 55 minutes

200g unsalted butter, plus extra for the tin

175g caster sugar

250g plain flour

100g rolled oats

50g ground almonds


400g rhubarb, trimmed and chopped in 2cm chunks

50g light soft brown sugar

1 tbsp cornflour

300ml ready-made custard

2 tbsp flaked almonds



Heat oven to 180°C/160°C fan/gas 4. Butter a 22cm square tin and line with baking parchment.

Combine the caster sugar, flour, oats and ground almonds in a large bowl, then stir in the melted butter. Set aside 250g of the crumble mix in the fridge, then press the rest, using the back of a spoon, into the base of the tin in an even layer. Bake for 15 minutes or until golden.

Toss the rhubarb with the brown sugar and cornflour in a bowl. Spread the custard over the biscuit base, then spoon over the rhubarb mixture. Scrunch the reserved crumble mix between your fingers and scatter all over the top, along with the flaked almonds. Bake for 40 minutes or until the fruit is bubbling.

Allow to cool, then chill in the fridge for 1hr before serving.
